The original function of Navajo weaving was to produce clothing: "shoulder robes, rectangular panel or wrap-around-dresses, semi-tailored shirts, breechcloths, and a variety of belts, shoulder robes, sashes, hair ties, and garters." The production of weaving flourished after the mid 1800s for trade with the white settlers.

A Brief Social History of Navajo Weaving The history of Navajo weaving continues; over the past century, Navajo weaving has flourished, maintaining its importance as a vital native art to the present day. Virtually all the nineteenth and twentieth-century styles of blankets and rugs are still woven, and new styles continue to appear. Navajo weaving from the Santa Fe collection, 1971-1996 ... A passion for Navajo weaving as an art form established the Santa Fe Collection. The aim of the collectors revolved around a fascination with modern Navajo rug styles and how certain weavers could take a relatively standard format and turn it into something "quite extraordinary" through the expert use of color and patterning. Canyon Road and Santa Fe Arts - Santa Fe New Mexico ... Navajo women learned weaving in the mid-1600s from their Pueblo Indian neighbors who had been growing and weaving cotton since about 800 AD. Spanish settlers had brought their Churro sheep to the region in the early 1600s and introduced the Navajo to wool.
